

50% of them do not know they have the right to be heard by a judge,

A similar proportion is unaware of the protective measure reason or its duration

14% say that in the households they do not receive the information requested



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CHALLENGES

- A national legal framework in agreement with the CRC and the Alternative Care Modalities Guidelines,
- Assurance that the measurement is appropriate and preventing unnecessary separation of children from their families.
- incorporate the idea of the foster children themselves, their experiences and ensure their participation in the whole process
- Listening to children not only guarantees their rights, but also improves the public response, while ensures greater success among caregivers, the child and their family of origin.
