














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The development of regulatory systems with limited government resourcing

(AKA Care reform on a budget)

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- 50,000 children in institutions
- Proliferation of institutions in UG since 1990's
- Unregisted, unregulated and privately funded
- Poverty and lack of access to education are the main 'push factor' for families placing children into orphanages



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5 years later (with limited resources)

- National Child Protection Working Group established Alternative Care Task Force in 2011 chaired by MGLSD
- Alternative Care Framework (2012)
- Updated Children (Approved Home) Rules, 2013
- Baseline research to ascertain situation of institutions in Uganda
- Children (Approved Homes) assessment toolkit
- Alternative Care Implementation Unit
- Child Helpline operational in all districts
- Alternative Care Curriculum
- National Alternative Care Panel run by MGLSD

Specialised Residential Care All child care plans should reflect and work to these alternative care priorities

All activities and attempts made for each should be recorded in the care plan along with next actions

These priorities should be key to all related policies and procedures

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Challenges

- High percentage of children being recruited across district borders into institutions (50%)
- Lack of Government human and financial resources (63 out of 189 approved staff positions filled)
- Lack of co-ordination between different civil society initiatives
- Orphan tourism and mission trips continue to fund orphanages
- Children's villages actively recruiting children.
- Resistance from orphanages to change model of care.
- Lack of social work capacity to implement framework
- Limited recognition of the importance of the role of a social worker.
- Lack of understanding from donors funding institutions
- Lack of enforcement of the approved Children's Homes Rules
- Lack of SOP's for closure and reintegration
- Lack of an inter-agency case management system

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Hope never runs dry

- Engaged and dedicated Government
- National Action Plan for Alternative Care to guide the implementation of an ambitious plan to ensure no child is placed in any form of institutional care, especially children under the age of three and reduce the overall number of children in institutions by 60% lead by the Alternative Care Implementation Unit
- Strong National Child Protection Working Group
- Documenting our journey and showing an alternative is possible on social media. Storytelling + data.
- Availability of funding (Terre des Hommes, USAID, Oak Foundation)
- National Association of Social Workers Uganda
- Strong coalition of CSO's lead by UCRNN engaging the Government in the reform
- Ugandans embracing children returning from institutions, becoming adoptive parents and foster carers




- Ugandans Adopt is a government-lead multimedia campaign promoting domestic fostering and adoption in Uganda.
- The multi platform campaign includes prime time TV shows, radio adverts, billboards, newspaper features, magazine articles and church and business presentations.
- 313 enquiries from parents in Uganda to adopt in the past 12 months.
- As a result, Ugandans Adopt have a bank of approved adoptive parents ready to adopt abandoned children.

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Top tips for story telling



- Story telling content is king.
- Beginning Set up the problem
- Middle what did you do to change the situation
- End The happy ending
- Be vulnerable.
- Be honest.
- Do not use jargon.
- Do not criticise.
- Highlight good create a critical mass
- Have a conversation do not broadcast.
- Give people the **power** to change the situation (donors)
