
















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Including children with disabilities

- Right to community integration and to a family
 - Recognized by the UN Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities (CRPD)
- Lessons learned from Georgia:
 - Children with disabilities should be at the center of the deinstitutionalization process
 - 2. Importance of continuing support into adulthood
 - 3. International cooperation should not be directed at building new institutions for children and adults with disabilities
 - 4. Private facilities should be accounted for in the process

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Supporting parents with disabilities

- Parents with disabilities are disproportionately at risk of loosing custody over their children
- Children of parents with disabilities are more likely to be put away in abusive institutions
- Mexico case



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How to include children with disabilities?

- On a case by case basis
- Provide and, where needed, create the necessary supports
- The family should be at the center of the planning process
- The family and the child are the experts on their own needs
 - Case of Adolfo, Mexico
- Importance of peer support programs
