




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Data Storage & Sharing

Where will the data be stored?

Global Installation

The Tracking Progress tool is installed on a global server, available for everyone to use it. As that, the information will be stored on our premises.

Local Installation

The tool is also available for download and to be installed on your own private premises. On those situation, the data will be stored on your premises.

Who will have access to the data?

Global Installation

If you have decided to use the global tool, the information will be available to Administrators of the tool and to Managers of the initiative.

Local Installation

If you have chosen to use the tool on your own local installation, the information will be available to the Administrators of your installation and to managers designed by him.


