

The Guidelines for Alternative Care

Essential to effective and sustainable DI reforms

- Guideline 6: Best interests of the child
- Guideline 10: Rights-based approach to participation and non-discrimination

The Sustainable Development Goals

16.2 End abuse, exploitation, trafficking and all forms of violence against and torture of children

4.1 By 2030, ensure that all girls and boys complete free, equitable and quality primary and secondary education leading to relevant and effective learning outcomes

10.3 Ensure equal opportunity and reduce inequalities of outcome, including by eliminating discriminatory laws, policies and practices and promoting appropriate legislation, policies and action in this regard



All children count, but not all are counted

- Children without parental care fallen off statistical map
- Limited data available
- While most vulnerable to experience abuse, neglect, lack of stimulation, and extreme and toxic stress

Open letter to the UN Statistical Commission and the Inter-Agency Expert Group on SDG indicators



Two recommendations:

- Ensure that children living outside of households and/or without parental care are represented in disaggregated data.
- 2. Improve and expand data collection methodologies to ensure all children are represented.

DI and IE were planned together


- Ministry of Finance regulations on ring fencing and transfer of resources
- The number of children with disabilities educated in inclusive mainstream schools has increased by 511% in five years


Mass training and awareness raising

- Total of 17,604 people trained
- IE module incorporated into teacher training curriculum


Child Participation
